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And when the Philistine looked about, and saw David, he disdained him: for he was but a youth, and ruddy, and of a fair countenance.

1 Samuel 17:42

The Event

When: near 1020 BC

Location: Ancient Judea in the small country of Israel

The Exact Spot: The Valley of Elah, amidst the craggy pasture lands of Judah

The Scene:

The peaceful country of Israel has been invaded by the noisome Philistines. All the men of war have been called to battle. On one side of the valley stands the mighty Philistine army in battle position, ready to fight, breathing threats and invectives. On the other side of the valley stand the Israelites, under the rulership of King Saul (the first King of Israel), with swords at the ready, but hearts that are melting with fear. For the past forty days they have stood this way - in position, but without confidence of victory. Every day, an emissary of the Philistines, named Goliath (a 12 1/2 foot warrior giant), strolls out into the open space in the valley between the two enemy camps and shouts a very specific challenge to the Israelites. Every day he moves closer, boldly attempting to provoke a soldier of Israel to rise up and fight him. For, he says, "Send your best man and fight me. If I win, you all become our slaves. But if your man wins, we will all become your slaves." But this test of Israel's strongest and bravest men has only proven one thing over the past forty days, and that is that there is no one in and amongst the mighty of Israel that has the moxie to face Goliath in hand-to-hand combat and let the fate of Israel rest upon his ability. King Saul, the "warrior-giant" of Israel, himself, is proved a coward and unwilling to step forward and defend his people and their dignity.

The Defining Moment:

On the forty-first day, a ruddy shepherd boy, likely in his young teens, arrives in the camp of Israel to deliver bread and cheese to his older brothers and to check on the status of the war. He overhears the boast from Goliath. This ruddy shepherd boy's response changes the course of a nation and sets a pattern for the construct of great manhood throughout the course of history.

Is it a good word or a bad word?

The Bad Side to Ruddy

- It's of the earth earthy
- It's of this world worldly
- It's not of heaven it bears the same color, the same hue of the cursed ground from which it was fashioned
- It's the color of the 1st man, the Old man (a.k.a. the flesh, the carnal, the Adam-condition)

Adam -

And the LORD God formed '*adam (man)* of the dust of the '*adamah (earth)*, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and '*adam (man)* became a living being.

Esau -

And the first came out '*admoniy* (*red*, *ruddy*), all over like an hairy garment; and they called his name Esau.

And Esau said to Jacob, Feed me, I pray thee, with that same *adom* (*red*) pottage; for I am faint: therefore was his name called '*Edom* (*red*, *like Adam*, *bearing the nature of the first born*).

The Good Side to Ruddy

- It's the color of life it's the symbol of the heart, of blood, energy, and zeal
- It's the color of the heavenly clothing the robe of righteousness

• It's the color of the 2nd Man - the one clothed in scarlet, covered in blood, as He went to battle against the Giant (the Spirit, the Heavenly, the Last Adam)

The Last Adam

Not marked by the Ruddiness of this Earth, but by the Ruddiness of Heaven's Life

There is a natural body, and there is a spiritual body. And so it is written, The first man Adam was made a living soul; the last

Adam was made a quickening spirit. Howbeit that was not first which is spiritual, but that which is natural; and afterward that which is spiritual.

The first man is of the earth, earthy: the second

man is the Lord from heaven. As is the earthy, such are they also that are earthy: and as is the heavenly, such are they also that are heavenly. And as we have borne the image of the earthy, we shall also bear the image of the heavenly.

God gave (George Muller) from the outset a very simple, childlike disposition toward Himself. In many things he was in knowledge and in strength to outgrow childhood and become a man, for it marks immaturity when we err through ignorance and are overcome through weakness. But in faith and in the filial spirit, he always continued to be a little child. Mr. J. Hudson Taylor, well reminds us that while in nature the normal order of growth is from childhood to manhood and so to maturity, in grace the true development is perpetually backward toward the cradle: we must become and continue as little children, not losing, but rather gaining, childlikeness of spirit. The disciple's maturest manhood is only the perfection of his childhood. George Muller was never so really, truly, fully a little child in all his relations to his Father, as when in the ninety-third year of his age.

Being Proven for the Task

Now when the words which David spoke were heard, they reported them to Saul; and he sent for him. Then David said to Saul, "Let no man's heart fail because of him; your servant will go and fight with this Philistine." And Saul said to David, "You are not able to go against this Philistine to fight with him; for you are a youth, and he a man of war from his youth." But David said to Saul, "Your servant used to keep his father's sheep, and when a lion or a bear came and took a lamb out of the flock, "I went out after it and struck it, and delivered the lamb from its mouth; and when it arose against me, I caught it by its beard, and struck and killed it. "Your servant has killed both lion and bear; and this uncircumcised Philistine will be like one of them, seeing he has defied the armies of the living God." Moreover David said, "The LORD, who delivered me from the paw of the lion and from the paw of the bear, He will deliver me from the hand of this Philistine." And Saul said to David, "Go, and the LORD be with you!" So Saul clothed David with his armor, and he put a bronze helmet on his head; he also clothed him with a coat of mail. David fastened his sword to his armor and tried to walk, for he had not proved them. And

David said to Saul, "I cannot walk with these, for I have not proved them." So David took them off.

2. Restrained to Serve Unnoticed and Unappreciated

- Serve Family

- Respond with Heroic Action even when no one notices
- Sprint unto every challenge with confidence

3. Restrained to the Simple Shepherd's Artillery - Faith in the Lord of Battles

Then he took his staff in his hand; and he chose for himself five smooth stones from the brook, and put them in a shepherd's bag, in a pouch which he had, and his sling was in his hand. And he drew near to the Philistine. ... So it was, when the Philistine arose and came and drew near to meet David, that David hurried and ran toward the army to meet the Philistine.

4. Restrained to Always Take the Lowest Place, and Never Presume a Higher One
